The brain develops as fast as it ever will in the first five years of life.

Nationally, our country underinvests in our children in the early years when it matters most.

Nationally, only 50% of children enter kindergarten ready.









In Onondaga County, only 40% of children are reading on grade level by 3rd grade (compared to the statewide average of 52%). Families with young children—especially first-time parents and those with both parents in the labor force—are stretched for time and resources.

With the right investments we can change the outcomes for children and families in Onondaga County.







#### THE NEED

66% of families surveyed by Talk, Read, Sing in Onondaga reported reading less than four times a week to their

#### WHAT WE'RE DOING

Through home visitors, pediatric providers and our early childhood partners, we spread the message that learning begins at birth and that talking, reading and singing with our children every day is the best way to prepare children for kindergarten. We reach thousands of families every year.



1 in 4 children are at risk for one or more developmental delays.

Parents, caregivers, providers can call 2-1-1 and ask any questions about parenting, child behavior, child development or if they are in need of locating services that exist within the community. We also promote free developmental screening for parents using the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ-3). This is a parenting support for all families in Onondaga County.



Vocabulary at 3 years of age is related to 3rd grade reading ability and local analysis showed gaps in home visiting services for this specific age group.

Early learning specialists visit homes and child care facilities to coach parents on how to read with their children. Families with children 18 months to 4 years get books and toys for their homes, as well. ParentChild+ graduates are 50% more likely to be prepared for kindergarten than their socio-economic peers. This is a parenting support for families in Onondaga County.



65% of parents with a child under six are employed in Onondaga County. Parents need quality child care while they are at work.

Piloting three strategies aimed at improving the quality of child care in Onondaga County at child care centers, family child care homes and legally exempt child care providers. We are focusing on increasing pay for early childhood educators in exchange for implementation of key components of quality programming.



30% of births are unintended pregnancies in Onondaga County. Among African American women, 53% are unintended, and 41% among Hispanic women. Created "Layla's Got You," a digital and grassroots community building campaign, including a chatbot and website designed to increase contraception knowledge and utilization among 16-24 year-old young women in Onondaga County.
